1	Dolchstoss	'Stab in the back' theory.
2	Constitution	A set of rules for Weimar Germany.
3	Republic	A country ruled only by a parliament
4	Article 48	Gave German President special powers.
5	Proportional Representation	Each political party was given a % of seats in parliament equal to the % of the vote. Allowed extreme parties power.
6	Coalition government	Many parties had to work together in parliament, making them weaker.
7	Right-wing	Believed in nationalism and authority.
8	Left-wing	Supported workers rights / communism.
9	Freikorps	Ex – army soldiers who kept weapons.
10	Treaty of Versailles	The peace treaty punishing Germany at the end of the First World War – Guilt / Armed Forces / Reparations / German Land / League 0f Nations

15	Women	Women given right to vote in 1918 / women gained jobs but were paid less.
